



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South East LLEN

The South East Local Learning and Employment Network (South East LLEN) is a community managed regional network made up of local organisations in Melbourne's South East, interested in working to give young people a better go at successfully moving through the education system to employment.

Our network membership includes approximately 250 members, including organisations such as schools, TAFEs, local businesses and youth welfare agencies, as well as individuals.

We DO NOT charge young people or our members any fees to be a member or try to sell them anything.

We DO work with our network members to develop sustainable partnerships between education providers, business and industry, community groups and parents and families that will benefit student participation, retention, attainment and transition.

WE DO THAT BY:

Researching within the local region (City of Casey, Cardinia Shire and the City of Greater Dandenong) to identify systemic gaps in education and services to young people and developing sustainable partnerships between our members to address participation, attainment, retention and transition issues.

The South East LLEN is governed by a Board of Directors elected by the membership of the network. The Board of Directors is made up of 10-12 people representing a range of education, community and industry providers. Half of the elected Board positions are renewed at the Annual General Meeting of the Association (usually held in May each year).

WHAT IS THE LLEN?


Established in 2001 as a result of a recommendation from the Kirby Report, the South East Local Learning and Employment Network (South East LLEN) was developed to bring together educators, employers, industry, welfare agencies, local government and non-government organisations.

Under the current funding agreement South East LLEN is funded by the Victorian Government.

The core objective of a LLEN is to improve participation, engagement, attainment and transition outcomes for young people within its geographic boundaries.

A LLEN also has a particular focus on those young people who are at risk of disengaging or who have already disengaged from education and training and are not in meaningful employment.







What are VETDSS Courses?

WHAT IS VDSS?

Vocational Education and Training Delivered to School Students (VETDSS) allows secondary students to gain practical skills in a specific industry while contributing toward the completion of the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE), VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM) or Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC).

PLEASE NOTE

The Senior Secondary Certificates in Victoria are undergoing reform. From 2023 the VCE Vocational Major will replace Intermediate and Senior VCAL and the Victorian Pathways Certificate will replace Foundation VCAL. At the time of printing this publication advice is being provided to schools regarding the implementation arrangements for the new certificates for 2023. VCAL units at Senior level will meet the requirements of the VCE VM, transition arrangements for current VCAL students have not been finalised. Any VET Units 3 and 4 sequence achieved and described in the following course listing will also apply to the VCE VM, additional ways students can achieve a Units 3 and 4 sequence from VET will be provided to schools.

BENEFITS OF VDSS

- VET programs contribute directly to the VCE, VCE VM and VPC and can contribute towards the ATAR score.
- Students gain industry experience and employability skills.
- · Creates a pathway to further study.
- Provides opportunities to develop effective relationships with industry employers.
- Enhances knowledge of employer and workplace expectations.
- Develops the capacity for teamwork and leadership.

SOUTH EAST HOME-HOST SCHOOL MODEL OF VET COURSE DELIVERY

The Home-Host School Model of VET delivered across the South East is a single organisational unit that ensures that young people have access to a broad range of affordable and local VET programs within their community.

The Home-Host School Model was set up in response to high demand which was hampered by the local cost of undertaking a VET course. The model has enabled every student in the South East region to access over 50 different VET certificates, including those courses available through TAFEs and private Registered Training Organisations (RTOs).

The Home-Host School Model relies on VET programs being offered by providers (mostly schools who are either RTOs in their own right, or are auspiced by local RTOs to deliver VET programs) to be open and available to any student in the region who wishes to enrol. These Host Schools VET programs are delivered in a separate way to 'internal' VET courses which schools offer only to their enrolled students.

The HOST school is the school or provider who opens their VET enrolments to any student in the region thereby 'hosting' the student who is enrolled at another school or agency. The HOME school is the school or agency at which the student is enrolled for the bulk of their secondary studies.

Enrolments in these 'Home-Host' School VET programs are coordinated through the South East LLEN as an 'honest broker intermediary' with courses taking place on agreed days of the week. Over the past six years the South East LLEN, working in partnership with local schools and RTOs, has been able to facilitate agreements between schools on amounts of program deposits, timing of enrolments and enrolment cut off dates.

The Home-Host School Model ensures that smaller schools in the City of Greater Dandenong, City of Casey and Cardinia Shire can access high quality VET courses even though they may have only one or two students who are interested in vocational programs.



FEATURES OF VDSS

- VET enables students to gain qualifications for all types of employment, and specific skills to help them in the workplace.
- Undertaking VET while at school allows students to mix general and vocational education and to make a start on training for a career before they leave school.
- VET programs are typically completed over two years and provide students with a qualification or partial completion of a nationally recognised certificate.
- Students can also study VET through school-based apprenticeships or traineeships (SBATs).

CREDIT TOWARDS THE VCE, VCE VM AND VPC

VCE VET programs are made up of VET qualifications approved by the Victorian Curriculum Assessment Authority (VCAA) to contribute towards the VCE, VCE VM or VPC. All VCE VET programs contribute to VCE Units that provide credit towards the VCE and VCE VM in the same way as a VCE study. Most VCE VET programs can provide credit for VCE Units 1 to 4.

A small number of shorter qualifications can provide credit for VCE Units 1 and 2 only. Each completed 90-hour block of VET equals one VPC credit. If you choose to do a VET qualification that is not from a VCE VET program, you may be eligible for credit towards your VCE, VCE VM or VPC. This is called block credit recognition. To receive block credit recognition, the qualification must be at certificate II level or above for the VCE and VCE VM, or certificate level I and above for the VPC.

STUDY SCORES AND ATARS

Some VCE VET programs are scored and some VCE VET programs are non-scored. VCE VET programs with a Units 3 and 4 sequence can be included in the calculation of your Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR).

Scored VCE VET programs: give you a study score for the Units 3 and 4 sequence that is achieved through school assessed coursework and an externally set examination. Scored VCE VET programs provide a study score that contributes directly to your ATAR, either as one of your primary four studies or as a fifth or sixth study increment. Non-scored VCE VET program: do not give you a study score but they can still contribute to your VCE. When you receive a Units 3 and 4 sequence towards your VCE from a non-scored VCE VET program, they may contribute towards the calculation of your ATAR by VTAC. Check with the VET coordinator at your school.

STRUCTURED WORKPLACE LEARNING

Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) is designed to help students apply the skills and knowledge they learn in their VET program in an industry environment.

SWL RECOGNITION

A student can gain credit towards the VCE, VCE VM or VPC by successful participating in SWL and completing a Workplace Learning Record.

STUDENTS WITH DIVERSE NEEDS

- The SE VET Cluster is committed to embedding inclusive education in all school environments for students with disability and diverse needs.
- Students requiring additional support to achieve successful outcomes in their VET program need to indicate this on their VET enrolment form.
- Arrangements will be made between the Home and Host schools to determine the support needs of students and provide access to educational and support services as necessary, so that students can meet the requirements of the VET course they are enrolled in.

UNIQUE STUDENT IDENTIFIER (USI)

A USI is required to enrol in a VET program. A USI is your individual education number for life. It also gives you an online record of your vocational education.

South East VETDSS Student Expectations

Students enrolling in a VET program through the South East VETDSS Cluster are required to adhere to the below expectations. Any additional course requirements set out by Host schools must also be followed.

1. ATTENDANCE

A minimum of 80% attendance is recommended. This gives students the best opportunity to learn and demonstrate competency that is aligned to the Units of Competency (UoC) and associated assessment requirements. A minimum of 80% attendance does not guarantee a student will be able to demonstrate competency and be awarded a full certificate. Whenever possible, students need to notify their Home school VET coordinator at least half an hour before the start of their VET class if unable to attend.

2. TRAVEL

Students are to behave in an appropriate and safe manner when traveling to and from their VET class.

3. PUNCTUALITY

All students are expected to arrive on time and prepared for class.

4. UNIFORM

Students are required to attend class dressed appropriately for their VET program. This may include a uniform and personal protective equipment (e.g., steel capped boots, safety glasses).

5. WORK REQUIREMENTS

All tasks as assigned by the VET teacher/trainer are to be completed to demonstrate competency. Students will be given multiple opportunities to demonstrate competency. If a student is unable to demonstrate competency for a UoC they will be awarded a partial completion and receive a Statement of Achievement. Also, if a student is unable to demonstrate competency for a UoC that is a prerequisite for another UoC, they will not be able to enrol/complete this UoC. The Home school VET coordinator will be informed if a student is not meeting the work requirements of their VET course.

6. STUDENT BEHAVIOUR

All students must meet the classroom expectations of the VET teacher/trainer and the behavioural expectations of the Host school. This includes meeting Work Health and Safety requirements.

7. STRUCTURED WORKPLACE LEARNING

SWL is a key feature of VET. SWL is compulsory for some VET courses and highly recommended for others. For courses requiring mandatory SWL it is the responsibility of the student and their Home school to organise a suitable work placement and communicate this with the Host school. Failure to meet the above expectations will bring a student's VET enrolment into jeopardy. It is important that students and parent/carers talk with their Home school VET coordinator if there are any concerns.



AIM

Certificate II in Applied Fashion Design and Technology is a two year qualification that provides participants with the knowledge and skills to achieve units of competency that will enhance their employment prospects in fashion or fashion related industries. This qualification will enable participants to gain a recognised credential and make a more informed choice of vocation and career path as well as expose them to skills, such as design, sewing and pattern making.




